1756-1811
Served in Penn Militia-1776
Sergeant in Penn. Troops
of the line 1777
Steel's Rangers,
S. C. Militia
1780-1781

Mrs. Mary McCalla
November 16, 1807
in the 32nd year of
her age.

There is a bronze
marker on her grave
which reads as follows:

Mary Adair (Nixon) (McCalla)
Twice married to soldiers
of American Revolution
Placed by Mary Adair Chapter
D. A. R.

She is buried in the McCalla
square, but I couldn't figure
out which McCalla she was
married to as Thomas McCalla
was the only one who had a
record of the Revolution War
on his monument and his wife
was named Sarah Wayne Gardiner
and the dates 1757-1821.
I wonder if Mary McCalla
husbands were buried on
the field of battle.
