"DEATH CLAIMS JONAS KILLIAN Leading Walnut Grower and Banker 71 Years of Age Irrigation System Devised in Early Days Here Sons Active in Financial and Citrus Undertakings"

Funeral services will be conducted Saturday for Jonas S. Killian, a pioneer in development of the walnut industry and of irrigation in Southern California, who died unexpectedly Tuesday. Until three days before his death he was active in business affairs despite his 71 years of age. An illness from indigestion incapacitated him and a sudden acute attack about 6 p.m. on the third day proved fatal. Death occurred at home.

The last rites will be conducted in Cresse's mortuary, Highland Park, at 10 a.m. Burial will be at Live Oak Cemetery, Monrovia.

He was the father of O. C. Killian of the York Boulevard State Bank; Howard S. Killian, operator of the El Monte Killian estate; Jonas E. Killian, president of the First National Bank, Riverside, and Ernest Walso Killian of Exeter, orange and grape grower. Their mother died some years ago.

Mr. Killiam was born and reared in Jasper, Ga. He lived for nine years in San Marcos, Tex., and with his wife came to California in 1887. They first lived at Monrovia and then went to El Monte. He engaged in walnut growing and eventually came to be the largest individual walnut grower in the world with some 300 acres of bearing trees. This development required irrigation that resulted in the establishment of the first irrigation pumping plant, as they are known, in this region.

Some years ago Mr. Killian divided his estate among members of the family, but at the time of his death he still operated fifty acres of walnut grove. He was

engaged in the last few years in developing the pecan industry around Yuma. At the time of his death he was president of the York Boulevard Bank. He was one of the organizers in 1913 of the Southern County Bank of El Monte and for a time was its general manager.

Mr. Killian was a member of the Masonic order, of the Highland Park Kiwanis Club and was a lifelong member of the Methodist Episcopal Church.

The Killian family home, 5057 Meridian street, was occupied by Mr. Killian and his wife by a second marriage, Mrs. Gertrude Dunlap-Killian, active in club and educational circles.

### **GEORGE KILLIAN (1740-1830)**

This is the first of two installments of the history outline of the Killian descendants of Andreas Killian through his son George Killian, 1740-1830.

George Killian was probably born in Pennsylvania about 1740, eight years after his father Andreas had immigrated to the American colonies from southern Germany via Rotterdam. Andreas Killian landed in Philadelphia in 1732 and it is believed that he and his family settled first in Lancaster or Bucks Counties, Pennsylvania. The youngest son of Andreas' marriage before that to Maria Bieber Kline, George moved to North Carolina with his father about 1743. Andreas may have acted on behalf of a number of German emigrants in Pennsylvania in acquiring large tracts of land in North Carolina immediately west of the Catawba River. This land was subsequently divided and conveyed to members of German families who moved to North Carolina from Pennsylvania. The Killians settled on a tract west of the Catawba River and along a creek that would later be called Killian's Creek, near today's joint Gaston and Lincoln County line.

Andreas remarried about 1753 to Mary Beaver Cline (Maria Bieber Klein, or Kline) when George was thirteen. The French and Indian War activities in the Catawba region threatened the pioneers and Andreas reportedly moved his family to the safety of the Statesville settlement area of today's Iredell County some twenty miles east of the Catawba River. After the war ended in 1763 Andreas returned to his Catawba farm and in 1765 sold some of his holdings and conveyed the remainder to his elder sons. About 1766 he purchased land on Clark's Creek two miles west of the small settlement of Newton in what would become Catawba County.

George was then in his mid-twenties and helped manage the family farm. About 1767 he married Mary Anne, whose last name is unknown, and they continued to live with Andreas until 1778 when George's half brother Daniel reached his twenty-first birthday and was capable of taking over

management of their seventy-six year old father Andreas' farm. George and Anne's firstborn son, Joseph, was born in 1768 and his second son, John, was born in 1770 at Clark's Creek, Catawba County, North Carolina.

Striking out on his own about 1770, George, then age thirty, moved twenty miles west to the Morgantown area (today's Morganton) which would later become Burke County. He entered claims and was awarded a British Crown Land Grant in 1773. Over the next few years he doubled his grants and claims while actively involved in the patriot's militia support for the American Revolution which was the sweeping the colonies and involving the Carolinas.

George served as a Captain of a Burke County Mounted Rifle Company under Col. Joseph McDowell from 1778 to 1782 when the Burke County Militia saw action at King's Mountain, Cowpens, Ramsour's Mill and Yorktown. Many of his Burke County neighbors were militiamen, i.e., Generals Joseph and Charles McDowell, Captain John Hardin, Captain Samuel Brittain and James Greenlee. George completed his militia service while in the more coastal Wilmington District at the end of the Revolution where colonial militia forces monitored the British army's departure. Later, after he settled in The Natchez District, his friends and business associates were fellow Patriots. Some of his children later married the offspring of fellow Patriots.

In 1782 George moved his family overland to the Watauga Valley in today's Tennessee where, along with others of the same mind, he built a raft on the Holston River in preparation for moving his family to the Natchez District. Venerable Killian family legend says that at some point while descending the Tennessee, Ohio and Mississippi Rivers, the family was attacked by Indians and the childrens' pet deer was killed by arrows. It seems likely that the family traveled with a group of immigrants who arrived in Natchez in 1782-1783. Once in The Natchez District, George set about establishing his farm and gaining Spanish Land Grants.

The 1784 Spanish Census shows he was on the two land grants and the family was flourishing. The family grew from Joseph and John to include Sara Ann, David, George Jr., Nancy Ann, Prescilla Ann and Mary Ann. The family was noted as 'Calvinists' by the Spanish and they later attended the Methodist Church. The farm improved and his livestock herd doubled every other year according to Spanish Censuses of 1784, 1787 and 1792. Farming tobacco, corn and cotton, George also increased his cattle, horse and swine herds. George amassed respectable wealth and gained local prominence. As his children matured, he endowed them with property as they married and started their own families.

By 1798, as the fledgling United States finally took control from the Spanish of The Natchez District that had been won in the Revolution, George's sole acreage ownership had declined as he had parceled out his holdings to his marrying children. By 1800, George was interested in moving to the Spanish controlled West Florida Province south of the thirty-first parallel (this line comprises the border between Mississippi and Louisiana today, forming the 'toe' of Louisiana's 'boot'). Having yielded the Natchez area to the colonists, the Spanish had retained control over the region south of the thirty-first parallel and east of the Mississippi River. Liberal with land grants and encouraging in their treatment of settlers, the Spanish opportunities attracted George. His past relationship with the Spanish authority had been good and profitable. A great grandson was named Gayoso (called 'Guy') after the Spanish Governor, Manuel Gayoso de Lemos.

Opportunity for free land elsewhere in the region was limited. President Jefferson's Louisiana Purchase transpired in 1803 but it was several years before the U. S. government had firm administrative control of the purchase. Prior to the Louisiana Purchase, acquisition and ownership of land west of the Mississippi River had been limited, settlement by non-French ethnicities being discouraged by French policies and uncertain governmental authorities. In 1804, at the age of sixty-four, George seized the

opportunity offered by the Spanish (as did many others from Natchez) and moved sixty miles southeast to St. Helena, in what would eventually be a Parish of the State of Louisiana. Four of his eight children, Joseph with his family, George, Jr., Mary Ann and Prescilla Ann moved with him and his wife, Anne, to The Spanish West Florida Province.

George and two of his sons acquired four thousand acres of grant lands immediately north and east of Mont Pellier, a town site in which he participated in founding. A very early Post Office was located in the St. Helena Courthouse at Mont Pellier. Records from the National Archives indicate its United States Post Office was established on March 7, 1814. Later renamed Montpelier in 1905, the settlement was, until 1810, a Spanish administrative center from which a large area of Louisiana's 'Florida' Parishes was governed and from which several new parishes would ultimately be derived. In the following years, George and his sons played key roles in civic and area projects; building Louisiana's first toll road from Killian Cross Road two miles east of Montpelier to Springfield, the primary Spanish governmental center, thirty miles further south. Six miles southwest of Springfield, the Killians built a wharf near the mouth of the Tickfaw River at Lake Maurepas. From there the Killians shipped timber and cotton into Lake Ponchartrain and on to the New Orleans markets. Two sawmills were built, called Hard Times and Hard Scrabble, where timber was sawed and sized before shipment to the New Orleans markets.

In 1810 the West Florida colonists revolted against the Spanish authorities and created the West Florida Republic. Short lived as an independent entity, the republic became affiliated with the United States-owned Louisiana Territory three months later. George, Jr. and Joseph's son John figured prominently in establishing the Montpelier Academy School in Montpelier. They contracted to refurbish and convert the former Spanish courthouse into a school. George, Sr. served on the first St. Helena Parish (Police) Jury and his sons also served as court jurors. Two of his grandsons served as Postmasters in the Montpelier Courthouse.

## William Killian son of Henry, son of Abraham, son of John, son of Andreas Submitted by Wayne Milam

William H. Killian was born 1842 in Georgia. William married Matilda E. Amerine born 1843 on November 26, 1871 in Cleburne County, AL in the home of his father, Henry. William is shown in the 1870 census of Cleburne County in the home of Mary Amerine and her children W. J. (Wyatt) age 22 and Matilda age 24. William was age 25. William was in Company H 10th Alabama Infantry CSA and was wounded in the battle of Gettysburg where he lost the use of his left arm. He applied for a disability because of the injury in 1883 in Etowah County, AL and was awarded \$15.

This family is in the 1900 census of Denton County, TX and the 1910 Census of Benton County, AR. Mary is in the 1920 Census of Benton County, AR as a widow. She is in the 1930 Census of Siloam Springs, AR. In her home are her son William and his wife Martha. William is an evangelistic singer and his wife is a pianist.

Alford Killian was born 1873 and married Eula Daisy McCleskey on January 23, 1902 in TX. Their children are Thelma, Freda, Howell, and Georgia Killian. This family is in the 1910 Census of Denton County, TX. Alford's brother William is also listed with this family.

Alford and Eula are in the 1920 and 1930 Census of Denton County, TX.
Lula Killian was born in 1879 and married Jesse Hallmark in TX.

William Killian was born in 1883 and married Edna Fox January 3, 1911 in Denton County, TX. Their children are William F. Killian, Cletus Killian and Margurette Killian.

The birth date on this tombstone is not readable but the death date is July 7, 1886. I believe this to be William Killian son of Henry. There is no other Killians buried in this cemetery. I do not know when or where his wife Matilda died or where she is buried.
