## Racing Killian's – Hickory Motor Speedway



# HISTORY

Hickory Motor Speedway is a short track located in Hickory, North Carolina. It is one of stock car racing 's most storied venues, and is often referred to as "The World's Most Famous Short Track" and the "Birthplace of the NASCAR Stars".

The track first opened in 1951 as a 1/2-mile (0.80 km) dirt track. Gwyn Staley won the first race at the speedway and later became the first track champion. Drivers such as Junior Johnson , Ned Jarrett , and Ralph Earnhardt also became track champions in the 1950s, Earnhardt alone winning five of them.

In 1953, NASCAR's Grand National Series (later the Sprint Cup ) visited the track for the first time. Tim Flock won the first race at the speedway, which became a regular part of the Grand National Schedule. After winning his track championship in 1952, Junior Johnson became the most successful Grand National driver at Hickory, winning there seven times.

The track has been re-configured three times in its history. The track became a 0.4-mile (644 meters) dirt track in 1955, which was paved for the first time during the 1967 season. In 1970, Hickory was shortened a second time to its present length of 0.363 miles (584 meters).

Hickory was dropped from the Grand National schedule after the 1971 season when R. J. Reynolds began sponsoring the series and dropped all races under 250 miles (402 kilometers) from the schedule. It remained in use as a popular NASCAR Late Model Sportsman Series venue. When the series was reformed as the Budweiser Late Model Series (later the Busch Grand National Series and currently the Nationwide Series) in 1982, Hickory played a prominent part of its first season, hosting six of the series' 28 races. Drivers Jack Ingram and Tommy Houston, two former track champions, each won eight times at the track in the Busch Series.

As more tracks began hosting Busch Series races, Hickory's involvement was progressively reduced to two races a year by 1987, and then just the Easter weekend by 1995. By 1998, the Busch Grand National Series began adding more races at Winston Cup Series tracks, and Hickory was dropped from the schedule after 17 years.

Hickory is still used as a venue for NASCAR's club racing division, the Whelen All-American Series. The CARS Tour featuring Late Model and Super Late Model touring series cars on the same night also features a full meet at the track.

One of the most storied tracks in stock car racing, Hickory in 2022 continues to host weekly racing from March through October as part of the NASCAR Advance Auto Parts Weekly Series. The track's "Big 10" events conclude with the Weekly Series championship night — with double points for all divisions — in September. RELATED: Watch Weekly Series action all season on FloRacing From Gwyn Staley in 1951 to Josh Kossek in 2021, the list of track champions at Hickory is loaded with notable names. And that list does not include the NASCAR national series winners at the track in the 1950s, '60s, '70s, '80s and '90s. Below is everything to know about Hickory Motor Speedway.

### **German Naming Practices**

#### **Preisch Price Preis**

I have taken a recent research class, in this class was a section on German Naming Practices. I will share that information here.

The **second name**, known as the *Rufname*, along with the surname is what would be used in marriage, tax, land and death records.

The first name may be a religious name and not used in civil records. So in a family with boys Johann Friedrich, Johann Peter, Johann Daniel, etc., the children would be called by and recorded in documents as Friedrich, Peter and Daniel. Usually, the name Johannes in these records marked a "true John" who would continue to be so identified.

We see examples of the German Naming Practice in our Price Research as I list the names of David and Agnes Hoffman Price's children.

Anna Margaretha Price: 1713 - 1820

Daniel Price: 1715 -1722

Johan Michael Price: 1718 - 1802

Augustine: 1722 - 1786 Daniel Price: 1724 -

Johan Heinrich Price: 1725 - 1797

Families would reuse given names for children who died young. We see this practice used with the name Daniel Price. There are even documented instances of families using the same name for two children who both survived.

Johannes is normally the secular name for John. German boys almost always were baptized with the first name Johannes or Johann, and abbreviated Joh.

German girls were baptized Maria, Anna or Anna Maria. This means a family could and often did have boys or girls with the same first name. You can see the high potential for confusion until you understand that the first name is often a name of tradition.

The religious name may be derived from the church, town, or in my best guess: the family patron saint.

We recognize the names of John Henry, Anna Margaretha, and John Michael, and I have also noticed the name Issac. I am often seeing the name Issac associated with David Price. I have not concluded the family placement of the name Issac. Is he a brother of John Michael Price, or could he be a son of my David? It is likely Issac could be a child of my David, there is a military document that states David is heir of Issac. Also Issac is enumerated in the early Rockingham County, Virginia Tax List with and close to David. In my research, the Price brother known as Augustine does not have a known religious name.

Jr. and Sr. could refer to Grandchild and Grandparent or even Uncle or Friend.

#### **Baptismal Sponsors**

In German-speaking areas, children were almost always named for one or more of their baptismal sponsors. The most common pattern would be for sons to be named in this order:

- first born son to be named for his father's father
- second born son to be named for his mother's father
- third born son to be named for his father
- fourth born child and on, uncles of the children

The same pattern applies to daughters but using the mothers' names (father's mother, mother, etc.).

The first and second male child were typically named after the fraternal and maternal grandfathers while the third child was typically named after a parent.

En & in suffix = female

Er & ner suffix = named after something.

Various marks used in German records.

- + cross mark indicates "death" connected with that date.
- "ux" indicates a wife or spouse.
- "ex" means "of" as in a locality such as "ex herxheim of Herxheim.
- "J" denotes joined or married (each priest had his own system of recording events)

#### **Nicknames**

Another naming tradition involves nicknames, often called *Kurzformen*. In English, most nicknames are created by dropping the last syllable of the given name. (for example, Christoper and Christine become "Chris") Germans, however, often shorten a given name by dropping the first part of it. It's important to note that these familiar forms are used in church or other records, even though by today's standards we might expect full or formal names to be used.

Some of the many examples (using more authentic but understandable German spellings) are:

- Nicklaus = Klaus
- Sebastian = Bastian
- Christophel = Stophel
- Christina = Stin or Stina
- Katharina = Trin

### **Price Family Questions**

I wonder if anyone has comments about the following

(Submitted by William "Bill" McCreight, an Andreas Killian Descendant)

The Price family is probably the best authority and they believe, although there is no proof, that Anna Margaretha Kilian was the Margaret who married Michael price. If that is the case, and it is most likely true, it seems to me that at least several of Andreas' children, and possibly as many as five, were born in Pennsylvania.

Michael Price arrived in Philadelphia two years after Andreas. Since the Price family, including Margaret, never went to North Carolina, the couple most likely met in Pennsylvania. They could have met on the way south, but I do not think so.

Judging from the birth date of Margaret's first known child she was probably married at the latest in 1745, which would make her 19 years old. She would not have married much younger, because it was customary in Franken for women to be 18 or older when they married.

Michael Price bought land in Virginia in 1748. It is not likely they wandered to an unsettled area of Virginia, still under occasional Indian attack, and then waited several years to acquire land. I think they left Pennsylvania in about 1747 and acquire their land in 1748. Andreas and his sons appeared in the North Carolina colonial militia list that same year. If they were related by marriage, they may have travelled together. There were still hostile Indians and it was safer to travel in large groups.

I know some of you have made diligent searches and found no evidence of Andreas and his family in Pennsylvania. But it is a matter of knowing where to look. If children were born there, it should be recorded in the pastoral acts of some church, but it is not practical to attempt a search the church books of every church that existed in Pennsylvania between 1732 and 1748. In fact it has not proven easy to even learn what church books exist from this period.

I thought it may be possible to narrow the scope of the search as follows.

I now have an unbroken chain of handwritten church book documents from 1516 to the signing of Andreas' oath in Philadelphia. One can learn a lot from the content of these documents and everything indicates it is highly doubtful the Kilian family could have accumulated the resources to immigrate. They would have to pay their passage and provide their own food for the voyage. They would have to possess enough money to buy tools and support them selves for at least a year before they could clear land and harvest a crop. I feel certain Andreas had to indentured himself to finance his immigration, as 65% of all Germans who immigrated up to 1776 did. After his Indenture expired he would have to work for wages long enough to accumulate the funds, in excess of

living costs, to buy tools, weapons, supplies and transportation south. The diary of Gottfried Johannes Arends shows that 27 years later in 1776 a daily wage was only 2 shillings. This can explain the 16 year gap in the records.

I thought if I could find the indenture contract this would show where Andreas lived for his first years in America and then we could concentrate on nearby churches to find his children's baptismal records. I thought these contracts must be recorded somewhere, because many disputes arose between the parties and the contract holder sometimes refused to release the person after the term of the contract.

However, neither the archives of Philadelphia, nor the archive of Philadelphia, nor the Pennsylvania German History Society have any indenture records. Also indenture contracts only appeared in court records when the contract was disputed.

Passengers to the British colonies were required to travel on British ships and most of the research I have found on indentures in America concerns British subjects. There were three types: First people who could not finance their immigration made a contract to pay by a certain number of years of service. Second, the British government simple rounded up people they regarded as social undesirables, shipped them off to the colonies and sold them as indentured servants. Last people convicted of crimes sometimes had the choice of being hanging or transported to the colonies as indentured convicts.

When the indentured person ran away advertisements were placed in the English language newspapers offering rewards for their return and there were bounty hunters who made a profession of catching and returning them. Searching these newspapers is one way to tract down the location of a person.

But, I do not think Andreas ran away. First it would be difficult to hide unless one disappeared over the frontier into unsettled territory. Andreas apparently made no attempt to hide. He served in the militia and he applied for land grants in his own name. Besides that Andreas had children. That hindered his movements and made running away without detection almost impossible. German indentures were usually very different. They were called redemptioners. Most Germans embarked at Rotterdam, Bremen or Hamburg on British ships. Most of the German immigrants, ca. 65%, had the money to reach one of these harbors, but that was all. The ship's captain took them on board if they promised a relative or a friend would redeem them by paying their passage within two weeks of landing. If no one came forward to redeem them, the captain sold the contracts.

This was a rather brutal system and many families, including young children, were separated and lost track of one another. Many advertisements appeared in the German language newspapers by people trying to find lost relatives. This may be a better bet for finding where Andreas lived; except for the fact that the North Carolina records show in 1748 the family was together.

Unless Andreas contested his contract in court, ran away or was separated from his family, the chances of finding his indenture or redemption contract are not promising.

Never-the-less I want to determine if the English and German language newspapers or court records give any clues.

I wonder if any of you have any other ideas about how to track down Andreas's children born in Pennsylvania.

Coldham, Peter Wilson. The Complete Book of Emigrants, 1700-1750: a comprehensive listing compiled from English public records of those who took ship to the Americas for political, religious, and economic reasons; of those who were deported for vagrancy, roguery, or non-conformity; and of those who were sold to labour in the new colonies.

Jean Deal the researcher is researching the index on Andreas and it may reveal some information for us in PA. Linda Hoyle gave me her name after I goggled and found a most likely help in this book.

If any of you have not downloaded this book, History of Goshenh 2829. It is from the right area.

#### (Response: Sherry Taylor, Michael and Margaret Killian Price Descendant)

I have been interested in the placement of Andreas and John Michael after their departure from their respective ships, Adventure and Winter's Galley. They were about 6 years apart in their arrival to the British Colony of Pennsylvania, 1732 and 1738, if memory serves. I have found Andreas in the colony of Pennsylvania and I do not think the research I have places him to be indentured.







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# LDEN RULES OF GENEALOGY



#### "SPELING DUSN'T COWNT"

Back in the day folks couldn't spell and many could barely write, so how a name sounds is more



important than how it's spelled. Use wild card or Soundex searches to help find variant spellings of names.

#### ASSUME NOTHING

Check all your facts, don't assume that any particular document is right or wrong, and always try to find other independent sources to corroborate your facts as much as possible. Verify, verify, verify. For instance, don't assume:

- your ancestors were married
- census information is accurate
- vital (or other) records were correct · your ancestor's life events were recorded
- ancestors had the same name as their enslaver

#### **USE DISCRETION**

Never lie in your genealogy reports, but use discretion when reporting family information, especially when it involves living relatives.

## ALWAYS DOCUMENT YOUR SOURCES, NO MATTER HOW MUCH THEY CONTRADICT ONE ANOTHER

Over time, you will compile more data and those seemingly contradictory pieces of evidence

may prove to be just the pieces of the puzzle you need | | | | to prove or disprove your 10111 theory. Be consistent as you Sources cite your sources. There are standard citation formats, but even if you just make up your own format for listing your sources, be consistent with it. You want your descendants to be able to retrace your steps, so always cite your sources.

## MOST DATES ARE APPROXIMATE

It's okay to state that someone was born "btw 1901-1903," "abt. 1845," or died "May 1915" if you don't have an exact date or where various documents have different dates. Which date is "correct?" They all are.

#### IF UNSURE, SAY SO

Future researchers will thank you for being honest if you simply say that you cannot prove a specific fact, yet you "suspect" such and such is true. Don't fudge the facts. Ever.

#### YOU CANNOT DO IT ALL ONLINE

Yes, we love doing research anline and there's nothing better than using the computer to find new sources, view digital images of original documents and even connect



with relatives. For family historians, the Internet will never replace the wonderful work of libraries, county courthouses, archives, and historical societies. Do as

much as you can online, then turn off your computer and hit the bricks!

### JUST BECAUSE IT'S ONLINE DOESN'T MEAN IT'S TRUE

The Internet is a wonderful thing but it's filled with oodles of bad information. Don't make the mistake of believing anything you find online at face value. Verify against other sources, even if you paid for the information you found online. Consult the original source whenever possible.

#### PASS ALONG YOUR RESEARCH

No matter how many decades you spend researching your family, your research will never be done. Plan on passing along your research to the next generation's researchers. Leave excellent notes, cite all your sources, explain your shorthand ... in essence, leave your research the way you'd have liked to have found it.

#### SPREAD THE WORD

You have our permission to use/publish these Golden Rules as much as you like. Just give us credit for them, okay?

#### DON'T DIE WITH YOUR STORIES STILL IN YOU

Giving credit to Dr. Wayne Dyer for his "Don't die with your music still in you," we want to

remind you to tell the stories as completely and as accurately as possible. Genealogy isn't about just doing research. Genealogy is about telling the stories and ensuring

that your ancestor's legacies live on for generations to come. Without the stories, the research won't do anyone much good. The legacy of your ancestors rests in your capable hands. Doing the research is fine, but always remember that you have been chosen to tell their stories.

#### DNA IS NOT A TRUMP CARD

DNA is just one of many possible sources of information you can use to verify or deny a relationship. Human error occurs when the results are transcribed, thereby providing false information. DNA results should always be used in concert with other sources.

### ANYTHING YOU POST ONLINE WILL BE "BORROWED"

You need to accept the fact that any family information you post online will be "borrowed" or outright stolen, and you will probably not get credit for all your hard work. This is the nature of the beast... the Internet. Get over it.

#### THE INTERNET IS CONSTANTLY CHANGING

Web sites change all the time, and to find the information you need, you may need to look in new places to find old information. Take a second look at old sites you haven't visited in a while, and don't be afraid to walk away from your favorite sites if/when you find new ones that provides better information. Seek and you may find.

#### The Genetics of the Kilians

(Shared by William "Bill" McCreight)

First, I would like to say, the name Kilian is not misspelled. I deliberately wrote it with one "L" because Andreas Kilian himself signed his name as Andreas Kilian. We have several of Andreas' signatures, on the ship's passenger list, on two oaths he signed in Philadelphia, on his will, and on several land records. Although Andreas' will is signed Andreas Kilian, the will calls him Andrew Killian. I never found it spelled with two "Ls" in any of the hundred documents I found in Germany, although I found a family named Kylian. It is probably spelled Killian in America, because only British ships were allowed to carry cargo and passengers to British colonies. A British ships officer spelled the passengers names the way they sounded to him, and one sees many strange spellings on most passenger lists.

Earlier I reported that Andreas Kilian's grandfather Georg's first wife Ursula Raysigs, who bore him five children, died seven days after the birth of her last child. Three months after Ursula's death Georg married Apollonia Burckard, and in 1649 they moved from Lobenhausen to Schainbach, where Apollonia had twelve children. When George died Apollonia was pregnant, and later had a stillborn child, so they actually had thirteen children, bringing Georg's total children to eighteen children.

When I visited Schainbach I met Walter Kilian, living in the same village where Andreas' grandfather Georg, born in 1616, had lived. Walter gave me what he knew about his ancestors in the 1800s, and I traced them to Georg's first wife Ursula Raysigs, whom I formerly had not discovered. According to church documents, we are half eighth cousins one time removed.

However, I wanted more proof, and Walter gave me a DNA sample. I have no Kilian male Y-DNA, because my Kilian connection is through my mother. Walter's Y-DNA matched several male Kilians in North Carolina, and this conclusively proved our relationship as well as my previous research that was only supported by documents, which are sometimes not correct, as were some of the Kilian documents I found.

But it also proved much more than that. I found three other people of interest related to Walter. Two who now live in Ireland and another now living in Scotland. The common ancestor of Walter and the two people in Ireland lived 2,500 and 3,400 years ago. The one in Scotland lived 2,900 years ago.

Walter's haplogroup is uncommon in Germany. It is most commonly found in Ireland, and among the Basque in Spain. The Basque are not an Indo-European people, as almost all Europeans are. They were probably the aboriginal people of Spain before the Indo-European people arrived.

Several times Walter told me "We are not Bavarians. We are Franks." The Franks were a Germanic people who migrated from Scandinavia to the area of the Rhine River in the 3rd century AD. They ultimately drove out the Romans, subjugated other Germanic tribes and established a United Kingdom that covered most of Europe. This culminated in the empire of Karl der Große, born in Aachen, Germany most likely in 748 AD, whom the French called Charlemagne. His grand-children fought over the empire and it was divided into West Frankia (France), East Frankia (Germany plus other lands) and Lotharringia (Alsace and Lorraine both now in France).

The fact that Walter Kilian's DNA shows a haplogroup mostly found in Ireland, he is closely related to three Celtic people who lived between 2,500 and 3,400 years ago and whose descendants now live in Ireland and Scotland, and the Celts originated in the area were Walter lived, for about 4,000 years before any Germanic tribes appeared outside of Scandinavia, all together indicates that Walter is of Celtic descent.

Walter died, and I usually visited his widow and daughter Andrea once a year. I asked Andrea what her father thought when I told him he was not a Frank. She said: "It's alright as long as he was not a Swabian." Swabia begins not far from where Walter lived, and was settled by the Germanic Suebi tribe.

Historians usually consider ancient chronicles as mythology, but Dr. Bryan Sykes, who pioneered mitochondrial DNA research, said that his experience shows that there is far more truth in ancient chronicles than the stories dreamed up by historians and archaeologists. I have found this to be true, not only with the ancient Irish and Scottish chronicles, but also with the Anglo-Saxon, Scandinavian and Gothic chronicles.

Dr. Sykes' mitochondrial DNA research showed that virtually all Europeans are descended from only seven women, the first came 40,000 years, and the last 10,000 years ago. Almost all other genetic lines have apparently died out.

Before cells divide, the pairs of chromosomes (one from the farther and one from the mother) entwine and exchange genes. Then the male Y-chromosome contains some genes from the grandmothers and great-grandmothers etc., and the female X-chromosome contains some genes from the same male ancestors.

But at the end of the Y-Chromosome there is an area of archaic genes that no longer have an active purpose. This part does not recombine. It is only changed by very rare mutations. That is why this part is of the most interest to genealogists.

The mitochondrial DNA is not in the chromosomes. It is passed only from the mother to both her female and male children, and never changes, except by extremely rare mutations.

Therefore, it is essentially the same in every generation back to the genealogical Eve. This makes it a valuable research tool. In my opinion, Walter's DNA proved the validity of at least the storyline in the ancient Irish and Scottish Chronicles, which says the Irish and the Scots came to Ireland from Spain in about 500 BC, where they formed three kingdoms. In about 500 AD a group of them moved from Ulster, Northern Ireland to the land of the Picts, which is now Scotland. We know from historical document that these Celts were subjugated by the Picts for centuries until Kenneth MacAlpin (Cináed mac Ailpín) married a Pict princess. He later became the first King of Scotland in 843 AD and reigned until 858.

DNA, language and culture show that the Picts were also Celts closely related to the Welsh, Cornish, and Breton Celts. There are two opinions of how Kenneth MacAlpin became king. One is that he overthrew the Pict leader. The other opinion is that Pict inheritance passed through the female line, making him legally King.

To fully understand why this proves the chronicle storyline is true, requires a look at the origin of the Celts. Almost all people in Europe are descended from the same Indo-European stem, with the exception of the Basque in Spain and the Uralic people. These are the majority of the Finns, Estonians and Magyar (who live in Hungary). The Basque and the Uralic people together only amount to about 4% of the European population, 96% of the Europeans are of Indo-European descent.

About 4,000 years ago, The Celts branched off from the Indo-European stem in Middle- Frankia, which is now in Württemberg Germany where Walter lived, and nearby parts of Austria. They spoke a proto-Celtic language.

The Germanic people separated from the Indo-European stem about 2,500 years ago in Scandinavia and spoke a Proto-Germanic language. The first Germanic Cimbri and Teutoni tribes moved south into what is now Bohemia in 200 BC, and a great many other tribes followed about 600 years later.

In about 500 BC the Celts began to expand into what became France, England and Spain.

In 390 BC they sacked Rome and settled northern Italy. Then they attacked Delphi, Greece but were driven off. They moved on into Parts of Russia and the land of the Scythians. The Scythians were a nomadic horse-riding people, of Persian origin, who dominated what is now the Ukraine and the neighboring parts of Russia.

The Celts have been called the first Pan-European Culture. But they left no written records except a few runic inscriptions on stone monuments, so other than archaeological excavations, little known about them except what was written by their enemies, the Greeks and Romans, who described them as barbarians.

Actually, they had an advanced culture and among their other talents, they were excellent metal workers. They had better weapons than the Romans and far out-numbered the Romans. The Romans could never have defeated them if the Celts had Roman discipline, and were united. This enabled the Romans to conquer them one tribe at a time.

The Celts did unbelievable gold work. I visited an expedition of Celtic gold work found all over Europe, including Russia, in Venice, Italy. Some of it was so fine that magnifying glasses were mounted over the gold work, so one could see work too small to see without the lens. This was the first and only time all of these works could be seen in one place.

Celts lived among the Scythians and traded with them, but there is no evidence that the Celts conquered them. The Scythians also did excellent gold work, which they could not have traded from the Celts, because the designs usually had various native animal themes, unlike Celtic gold work.

Getting back to the ancient Irish and Scottish chronicles, which say the Celts came to Spain from the east, via Egypt. Considering the above, this was probably the land of the Scythians, Ukraine and southern Russia.

When the Romans arrived in Spain in about 218 BC there were already many Celtic tribes there. Some had mixed with the indigenous Iberian people and were called Celtiberians. The Romans lost several battles against the Celtiberians and other Celtic tribes. In fact, they continued to harass the Romans and kill Roman soldiers for almost 200 years.

There is still a Celtic region called Galicia, in north-western Spain with an active Celtic culture. The Romans called the Celts Gaul's, and there are other regions in Europe called Galicia.

The Greeks named the Celts (Ancient Greek Κελτοί (Keltoí). In the 6th century BC, Hecataeus of Miletus called the people in Southern France Keltoi. Herodotus called the people living in western of Europe "Keltoí.

It is not clear what Keltoi means. Others used Keltoi for various meanings, such as: "tall ones," "heroic ones," "to strike," "hidden people," Celtic religion forbid writing mystical knowledge.

In Latin Keltoi is Celtae, but the Romans called them Gaul's or Galli. This comes from Greek town "Γαλάται" (Galátai). The Gaul's invaded southeastern Europe and settled in Galatia, in modern Turkey.

History, archaeology, DNA and present Celtic cultures all support the conclusion that the ancient Irish and Scottish chronicles are correct, at least in the fundamental story they tell, and they are not mythology.

I had my DNA tested at FamilyTree DNA, 23AndMe, and 24Genetics. In addition, the National Geographic Society financially supported the Geographic projects 1 and 2. I submitted my own and my wife's DNA to both projects. The two projects tested nearly a million people in 120 countries. They used DNA evidence to map the migrations of modern humans out of Africa to populate the rest of the world.

The Neanderthals and Denisovans were not part of this movement. They were already in Europe and Asia for a million years before any modern humans came. They must has evolved in Europe and Asia because their DNA is not found in Africans, but most Europeans have about 3% Neanderthal DNA and about 2% Denisovan DNA, as both my wife and I do. The Denisovans have 17% Neanderthal DNA.

The presence of Neanderthal DNA in Europeans is because the first modern humans in Europe arrived in the last Ice Age. The Neanderthal had moved south of the glaciers and they coexisted with the new-comers until they became extinct. About 20,000 years later, the ice began to melt and eventually the new-comers moved into a totally uninhabited Europe.

Because my mother's Kilian mitochondrial DNA dates back to the genealogical Eve, except for very rare mutations, I could use the Geographic Project 1 and 2 to trace their migration out of Africa to Europe.

Most of these people came from central east Africa because this is near the only two ways out of Africa without crossing water. They probably had no intention of migrating, but were simply following their primary food sources, grazing animals.

Between Ice Ages, when sea levels were high, they could go through the Sahara, which was then plush grass-land, shown by cliff pointing in the Sahara with people hunting grazing animals. This led through Gaza on into Anatolia, in Turkish west Asia, and from there, via the Bosporus into southern Europe.

During Ice Ages the sea levels were very low and the second way was to walk across the then dry Bab-el-Mandeb Straits between East Africa and what is now Yemen, then north through Saudi Arabia into Anatolia and via the Bosporus into Europe.

The Germanic people are the only people known to not enter Europe via the Bosporus.

They went north through what is now Russia, along the Black Sea to the Sea of Azov, then along a River Valley to an uninhabited Scandinavia, where they remained until 200 BC.

When my maternal ancestors left Africa there was no Ice Age and sea levels were high. They took the Gaza route into Europe, where the Celtic branch divided to form its own culture, and turned toward present-day Middle-Frankia where Walter Kilian lived. The others went on to central Europe.

My paternal ancestors left Africa during the last Ice age, when sea levels were extremely low, and they took the route into Yemen and Saudi Arabia, on to Anatolia, then followed the same route as my maternal ancestors, but they continued to what is now Belgium, across the channel into England and ultimately to Scotland. So, some of the Scotts came this way and others came from Spain to Ulster, Ireland, then to Scotland. So, my Haplogroup is not the same as those who came via Ireland, and is not among the most common haplogroup in Scotland.

With the aid of DNA, I was able to learn that the McCreight surname emerged in south- western Scotland about a thousand years ago, when the surnames were first required. Celtic, Germanic and Scandinavia people used their father's name, with the genitive form of "son of" added as either a suffix or a prefix, as a surname. In Scottish and Irish Gaelic, the prefix "Mac" or its abbreviation

"Mc", means son of. In Welsh Gaelic it is "ap". In Danish it is the genitive suffix "sen," in Swedish and Norwegian "son", and in German "Sohn".

The earliest McCreight documents I could find were of William McCreight, born in Scotland in 1645, about 645 years after the name emerged. Because fathers of cousin, uncles, etc. had different names, with DNA one finds many 1st cousins with various other surnames.
