More on Andrew M. Killian from the February Newsletter

In the last Killian Newsletter I asked the question who is Andrew M. Killian? While we may never know the lineage of Andrew Miles Killian back to Andreas this is what we now know.

Andrew Miles Killian was born on February 11, 1829 NC and died August 16, 1900 as transcribed from his tombstone at City Cemetery, Stone Mountain, GA. He was counted in the 1900 census of DeKalb County, GA on June 25, 1900. He married Lucy Ann Armstead on May 11, 1854 in Fulton County, GA. He enlisted in July 1864 in Atlanta; a private of Clemmon's Company, Georgia Infantry, CSA. He surrendered in Decatur in April 1865. After the war, he was a blacksmith in Stone Mountain. On July 4, 1876, Killian attained local celebrity by dynamiting two enormous boulders off of Stone Mountain in commemoration of the Union's Centennial. After his death, Lucy filed for and was granted a pension for her husband's Confederate service.

"The Origin of the Kilians in Germany" by William Randolph McCreight born 1934 in Newton, North Carolina.

Book review by Dan Sipe

William Randolph McCreight just published a book written on Andreas Kilian of Bavaria, Germany. It presents recent records discovered in Germany on the Kilians. He comes to the conclusion that Andreas Kilian of Bavaria is the one and same Andreas Killian of North Carolina. He has centered his book about Andreas Kilian's baptism record; marriage record; Andreas' children's Baptisms at Saint Gallus Lutheran church in Erzberg Germany; and the marriage and burial records of his parents. NC Pioneer Andreas Killian's father was also Andreas and his grandfather was Georg. It investigates these records and other records of the times such as politics, wars, religion, means of travel, laws of marriage and possible origins of the Kilian name. It is filled with colorful pictures of Kilian sites and many other German sites that draw the reader into the book. It acts as another building block to understand Germanic records as they relate to genealogy and help those who are serious in tracing their roots in Germany. It carries the reader from the rural German countryside to the departure of Andreas to America at Rotterdam but leaves the American story for others to write about. He has expressed his research information well and has documented his sources well. It is a valuable book for the descendants of Andreas Kilian and others interested in family history and how it is formed over the years.

Killian/Killion DNA Project by Cheryl Mann Killian

I have a big correction to information I first reported in 2006. The DNA project does not have a descendant of Jacob Killion of Orange County in the project. I identified the project member as being a descendant of Jacob based on the earliest known ancestor's name and location-this identification was not correct. Our DNA project member Woodroe "Woody" W. Killian's father was Lloyd Jewel (1913). Lloyd Jewel's father was William Joseph Killian born 1863 IL; found on the 1870, 1880, 1900, 1910 and 1920 census. William Joseph Killian parents are Joseph born 1838 in MO and wife Elizi Louisa née unknown. Joseph born 1838 was not found in the 1850 census to connect him back to his father.

Woody is an exact match with George Weldon Killian and a close DNA match to several descendants of John (son of Andreas) project members. I apologize to everyone for misidentifing Woody's lineage. With this correction it is hopeful we will find "Woody's" lineage to back to Andreas.

This correction places "Woody" into the group with descendants of Andreas. This correction places descendants of William Killion, possible son of Revolutionary Solider Michael Killion, into separate groups of Colonial North Carolina Killians/Killions. This is in keeping with meeting one of the objectives of the Killian DNA project; Eliminate or confirm the relationship of individuals or lines to other Killian/Killion lines. a) Andreas Killian lines. b) Michael Killion lines. c) Pennsylvania and other Colonial Killian lines. d) Irish Killion lines.

For those who have read William Randolph McCreight's book "The Origin of the Kilians in Germany", many will realize Mr. McCreight and I have a different opinion in the value of the Killian DNA project. Quote from Mr. McCreight's book, "There is a group in the Killian Association conducting a DNA project to determine if the members of the group have a common ancestor. They all already know from historical records they have a common ancestor, Andreas Kilian. . . ". In response to the "Historical records" Bill mentions, written records can be accurate and helpful, but DNA offered proof of lineage to Andreas. In fact, the DNA project is already credited with the following discoveries about incomplete historical records:

- Jonas Conrad Killian was born out of wedlock and was baptized, Jonas Conrad Dietz at Zion Lutheran Church, Catawba County in 1827.
- 2. William Riley Killian was first documented in the Lincoln Co. North Carolina Court Minutes, October Sessions 1821: "Ordered by Court that William R. Killian, 7 years old the 3rd. day of last May be bound to Henry Mengers..." (Court records research by Kathy Sullivan).
- 3. It has been a matter of debate if Daniel Killion born 1777 of Iredell County, NC was a descendant of Andreas Killian or Michael Killion.

Conclusion: DNA results has confirmed the three men named above are descendants of Andreas Killian, while at the same time historical records only show they carried the Killian surname. In this we see the DNA project as a way of connecting descendants of Andreas Killian with weak or no paper trail back to the clan.

I am asking male Killians to please consider joining the Killian DNA project and help descendants of Andreas link themselves back to their lineage. The 37 marker test is preferred for Andreas descendants or the 12 marker test for Irish and descendants of Revolutionary Solider Michael Killion.

The 2009 Andreas Killian Book

As I sit here to write this update on the New Killian Book, you should know the book is almost finished. Apex Book Manufacturing Company (a print on demand company) has reassured me twice the book will be finished on time. Yet no matter how much reassurance Apex gives me, I know the book needs to be indexed which cannot be done until the book is formatted and pages are numbered. The days keep ticking away.

I want everyone to know the new Andreas Killian book would not have been possible without the donation of information Wayne Milam has collected over the years. The chapter by William "Bill" Hinds on the Leonard Killian family is a fantastic detailed account of Andreas' first son. The book gained German records with the addition of 2 chapters written by William McCreight. Many chapters were written and re-written as historically correct as possible through the edits and additions by Thomas Eugene "Gene" Killian. Wayne, Bill, William and Gene formed the frame work of the book. This does not discount the contributions of authors Dan Sipe, Sandy Phillips and Wayne Setzer. Also there was the behind the scenes people; I cannot tell you how many people were involved in getting this book to where it is today. My sincere thanks to you all.

William McCreight of Germany added his knowledge of Andreas Kilian of Steinbach, Bavaria, Germany. This knowledge and research includes information on Lutheran German Records, the social system in Andreas' time and the trip from Steinbach to Philadelphia.

The 17 or so years between Philadelphia to North Carolina has been explored as theory only. When Cletus H. Killian researched the Colonial Killians, I found he was not sure where Andreas Killian and his family lived for those 17 years. This chapter leaves me the feeling someone should take up the gauntlet and look for Andreas in the state archives of Virginia, Pennsylvania, Maryland, Delaware and maybe New Jersey.

The chapter on DNA introduced other colonial Killians into your New Andreas Killian book. We have 2 chapters on Killian's not related to Andreas Killian; Pennsylvania Killian and North Carolina Killians born before 1800. While the book is titled "The Family of North Carolina Pioneer Andreas Killian (1702-1788); Andreas and his children and grandchildren", the book has far more information than I ever expected.

The book has gone through a metamorphosis; going from my envisioned booklet, to a hard back book with a CD of information available on Killians up to the 20th century, back to the booklet I first envisioned, to a paperback book of about 200 pages of 18th century Colonial Killians. I hope everyone will be pleased with the final result.

Who was Cletus H. Killian? By George Weldon Killian

Cletus H. Killian was born 1891 in Missouri. He researched his Killian ancestry in 1940s and 50s. It was he who thought that the Andreas Killian's ancestry might include Wolfgang-Phillipp Kilian and such information became widely distributed. He was an engineer, Patent Attorney and inventor. In the book *Forces of Production: A Social History of Industrial Automation* (published 1984) by MIT professor David F. Noble, devotes three pages to Cletus stating "Cletus Killian was an early entrant in the field of automatic machine tool control, as well as a pioneer of programmable electro-mechanical computers." Cletus gave the dedicatory address at the unveiling of the Andreas Killian monument in 1952. He died in 1962.

Back to Andreas

Our pioneer ancestor came from Germany on the ship Adventure. Landing at Philadelphia where he took the oath of allegiance September 12, 1732.He came to North Carolina about 1747 and later established a home about two miles northwest of here (Old St Paul's Church).

Captain John Killian 25 April 1796 - 10 November 1858

"This is the second installment of the history of Captain John Killian a descendant of Andreas Killian through Andreas' grandson Philip Killian. Capt. John Killian and his family moved to Missouri after the War of 1812. They were among the first settlers there. While living in Missouri the family met Oliver Cowdery, who was one of the six original members of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. John joined the Church in September 1831 and was baptized by Oliver. The members of the LDS Church started to face ever increasing hostilities from the local citizens and the family moved to the town of Montrose, Lee, Iowa across the Mississippi River from Nauvoo."

Just as in Missouri, the local citizens started to find fault with the leaders and members of the LDS Church. John took an active part in protecting the leaders and members of the Church. In the book "A History of the Church" by B. H. Roberts, Joseph Smith in June of 1844 was giving some instructions to some members on where he would be staying to keep away from a mob. In these instructions he states: "If you can ascertain by tomorrow morning that there is anything wrong, come over the river to Montrose, to the house of John Killien (Killian), and there you will learn where we are." A few days later a mob killed the Prophet Joseph Smith and his brother Hyrum while they were in a jail.

In 1846 the members of the Church were forced from their homes and fled west. They stopped around Council Bluffs, Iowa and made camp. They referred to the camp as Winter Quarters. Here many lived in tents or wagons until they could move west. Brigham Young, as the new leader of the LDS Church, had set his sights on the Salt Lake Valley. There they hoped to find a place to practice their religion in peace.

The first pioneer company reached the Salt Lake Valley in 1847. The trip from Winter Quarters to Salt Lake was over a thousand miles. John, his wife Sally, his sister Letha Jane Killian Hood (the widow of Joseph Hood), her two daughters and Harriett came across the plains in 1850. Because they did not travel with an organized wagon train, we do not have a record of their trip.

Jacob, his wife Susan and Franklin Killian were members of the Joel Edmund's company in 1852. Their half-sister, Rebecca Emma Conley Tryon, and her family were also with this company. They are listed on the company records

as follows: "Crossed the Mo (Missouri) river June 8th, 1852... Franklin Killion, Age 23, 1 loose cattle, two horses, 1 gun, Jacob Killion, age 21, I yoke oxen, 2 loose cattle, 1 horse, 2 ducks, 1 gun, Susan Killion Age 16." We do not have any other record of when the other children came to Salt Lake.

After the members of the Church arrived in Salt Lake many were asked to colonize other locations. Many of John's children took part in the colonization of Utah and the west.

George married Matilda Phoebe Cochran on July 19, 1853 in Clark County, Missouri. They went to what would later become the Concho area of Arizona. They had five children.

Thomas married Mirium Elizabeth Sampson August 18, 1846 and helped settle the Parowan, Utah area. Thomas adopted Mirium's son by her first marriage and they had six more children together.

Letha Jane remarried in October 1850 to Elijah Newman. Elijah was an early member of the Church, like the Killians, and had experienced many of the

same hardships in Missouri and Illinois. He was one of the original pioneers to come across the plains with Brigham Young's first company. They moved to

Parowan, Utah in 1851 and had seven children.

Nancy married Aquila Hopper, a second cousin to her mother, on July 13, 1848 in Lafayette County, Missouri. They were part of the original settlers of Salem, Utah. They had at least five children.

Franklin moved around and eventually ended up in San Bernardino, California. Some accounts say that he married a Spanish Indian lady by the name of Polonia Morongo.

Almira Josephine Killian married her cousin, Joseph Charles Killian, on 30 Mar 1845 in Perry County, Missouri. They stayed and raised their family in Missouri. They had 11 children with only four living to adulthood.

Jacob Killian and Susan Coons were married sometime between 1850 and 1852. They joined Nancy in settling Salem, Utah. They had at least seven children.

Harriet Emma married John Busby on August 28, 1857 in Salt Lake City, Salt Lake, Utah. They raised seven children in Salt Lake.


John stayed in Salt Lake. The pioneers had come to the mountains and had suffered many hardships; unfortunately all was not as well as the pioneers had hoped. War and strife continued to intrude itself in the Zion that the pioneers were trying to create. As the Nauvoo Legion had protected the Mormons in Nauvoo, Brigham Young was compelled to continue this protection in the Utah Territory. John, ever the Soldier, was elected a Captain of Company B of the Battalion of Silver Greys Infantry of the Salt Lake Military District. (The family has the original commission signed by Brigham Young in 1855) Part of his assignment was protecting Emigration Canyon. The ill-fated Donner Party had first used Emigration Canyon in 1846. It was also used as the final camp before Brigham Young's company entered the Salt Lake Valley in 1847.

John and one of his militia commanders, Daniel H. Wells, worked as partners to protect the access and resources contained in the Canyon. A little later, Daniel H. Wells was given a grant to control the lumber being removed from

the canyon. In his original grant the people of the Salt Lake Valley were to make arrangements with John Killman (Killian), his partner, to remove any lumber. John was later awarded a similar grant as Daniel and made the move to the Cottonwood Canyons. John built a large ranch in a small side canyon about five miles up the main canyon. This small canyon would soon come to be called Killian Canyon. The spelling of John's last name was misspelled and the canyon is now called Killyon Canyon. The land John owned is now part of the Wasatch National Forest and thus is protected under federal law.

John died as a result of a logging accident in his beloved canyon and was buried there in November of 1858. He lived a great life, survived many trials and as his obituary said he lived and died a good man, in the faith, practices and enjoyment of his religion.


Note from Thomas Eugene "Gene" Killian; There is a 'typo' in the obit. It lists "Almer" Killian as a deceased brother. His name was "Almut" (Almut W.) according to Willard A. Israel's 1995 book and the records I have.
