I also would like to thank the other board members and the members at large who make the reunion happen. You will find a list of these fine people on the second page of this newsletter.


In closing, I would invite all who have attended a reunion before to please come back and bring a family member with you; let them see what we do. We are proud of what we have accomplished in the AKDHA.

Donation of Books from Dr. William D. "Bill" Killian





What One Andreas Killian Descendant Is Doing

Russell Hinds Submitted by William L. "Bill" Hinds

Thousands of descendants of Andreas Killian have been and are involved in different lines of work in places around the globe. Among Andreas' descendants there are people like Russell Hinds who lives in Northwest Arkansas. Now a grandpa, each day brings new experiences. While a student, Russell took flying lessons, and then got his license. He went to work for the local police department, working undercover narcotics. His mother was deeply concerned about his safety, but Russell was committed to his job. Suddenly bomb threats became a threat to the local department. With the help of a retired army sergeant whose specialty was ordinance disposal, Russell got approval to start the Northwest Arkansas Bomb Squad. It took a lot of dedication, fundraising and hard work, but the squad became known far and wide for their skill. A four page article on Russell and his time with the bomb squad was printed in <u>The Detonator, Official Publication of the International Association of Bomb Technicians and Investigators</u>; Entitled, *"Hinds Sight is 20/20, a Tribute to Russell Hinds"*. It was written by Sgt. Michael Meadors, who now leads the bomb squad headquartered at Northwest Arkansas Regional Airport. Fully equipped with armor and robots, they are able to deal with bomb threats of all types, even an armored laboratory in which the "bomb" can be analyzed, remotely, for explosives, biological, or radiation threat, and then destroyed safely.



Pictured is the present facility, the mobile truck, 2 remote controlled handling and retrievers. Some of the men, and the mascot. What's not in the picture is the heavily armored sphere mounted on a separate trailer than can be used to detonate the bomb safely. They set off one in the sphere down the street and there was no sound or shock three blocks away. That was a test.

As for Russell, he now works just down the street. He retired from the police department moved to the corporate world with worldwide security for Wal-Mart stores wherever they're located. His job is to make it safer for people who work, shop, and visit a Wal-Mart store. Those cameras you see, Russell can select any one of them in any store from his office in Bentonville, Arkansas.



Gene Killion's Retirement Is Official Submitted by Mark Killion

Esteemed Illinois beekeeper, Gene Killion gave his last public presentation January 30, 2015. He got his first beehive at age 5 from his father, Carl Killion (1899-1979). Carl started raising bees at age 16. The father-son team had nationwide recognition as experts in honey production and raising bees. After reaching his 90th birthday, Gene decided it was time to slow down. He retired from commercial beekeeping in 2014, ending a family business that spanned 99 years.



At the height of "Killion Honey" production, the father and son kept nearly 1,000 hives at locations in northern Illinois. "We specialized in comb honey, which is more difficult than liquid honey, because the bees want to swarm," Gene said. "We developed a process to lessen swarming."

In addition to honey, Gene specialized in raising queen bees for his own hives, and he also sold the queens to other beekeepers.

"Killion Honey" was a long-time Paris business, but most people did not know the extent of its operation. "Killion Honey" was the first company to package honey in the now familiar bear-shaped bottles.

Gene is now in the ranks of hobbyist beekeepers. He maintains two hives to supply himself and his family with honey for personal use. "Killion Honey" is no longer available for sale.

THE 7TH ANNUAL KILLIAN REUNION

Last year, Roy Garfield "Bud" Killian submitted the obituary of John Wilson Killian and a newspaper clipping entitled "*Killian Ancestor Worked Alongside Martin Luther*" by Dalton Stowe. The obituary was published on page 7 of the Fall 2014 Killian Family Newsletter, but the newspaper article took a little research.

The first line got my attention, "DALLAS.--More than 100 members of the Killian clan met...." Unbelievable, today we are pleased to have 70+ attendees. So when was this Reunion which attracted more than 100 members of the Killian clan? The article said Raymond L. Hefner (1885-1953) read the histories of Joseph and Fredrick Killian, two grandsons of Andreas, compiled by Gladys Stine (1906-2000). Therefore this reunion had to be prior to Mr. Hefner's death in 1953. Raymond Hefner was an active member of the Reunion for many years so I needed more.

A little more insight to the year was found with this reference: "Oliver P. Rhodes, 85-year-old [1857-1946] Dallas citizen, who was responsible for organization of the Rhodes clan some years ago, was also instrumental in making the Killian reunion an annual event. His mother was Caroline Killian, who married Melchi Rhodes." Now we know this reunion was held prior to 1946.

A few more names helped the search for which reunion this could be; C. E. Rozzelle, Wyke Lippard, Guy C. Killian (President), Jesse C Sigmon (Vice-president), Dora Rhodes Carpenter (Secretary/Treasurer), John F. Carpenter (Executive Committee).

Reading minutes is not easy. While the top of the page will say "*The 7th Killian Reunion was held Aug 7*, *1941*…" there are published pages and there are pages of notes. The notes are taken during the meeting. The published pages are written and ratified after the fact. I did not find an attendances list for this reunion, but all the names in the newspaper article match the <u>www.AndreasKillian.com</u> archive pages for 1941.

From the published reunion meeting of 1941: *"Few attended the meeting because of recent rains which had swelled the streams and at places made it unsafe to cross the bridges."*

"Few attended" doesn't sound like the newspaper's report of "More than 100 members of the Killian clan...". This leaves my question unanswered and me to ponder the possibility the Killian Family Reunion normally attracted 100 or more each year.

The 7th Reunion notes and minutes are "COLD HARD FACTS" and nothing special. But this newspaper article is special. Yet you must remember, it is a newspaper article and newspapers don't sell without a little flare. The headline "*Killian Ancestor Worked Alongside Martin Luther*" was the flare and it is flare that has no documentation behind it. Anyone that reads the first paragraph of the "Killian History" will know this has been found to be wrong. More flare was; "*DALLAS.--More than 100 members of the Killian clan met....*". Don't get me wrong, the article is worth reading and I am passing on some highlights.

The key speaker that day was C. E. Rozzelle, pastor of Main Street Methodist Church, Gastonia, NC. His topic was "*What Is Your Name*?" based on Proverbs 22:1. He boasted North Carolinians had excellent family records, saying: "*In the New England states it's 'How much to you know*?', *in New York, 'How much do you*

have?', in the west 'What can you do?', but in North Carolina, 'Who was your grandfather?'. Rozzelle said, "You can get away from anything else, but never from your name." He recited the poem "Your Name" by Edgar A. Guest and said "You can get away from anything else, but never from your name."

From my research I am sure this was the 7th Annual Killian Reunion. There were no reunions held from August 7, 1941 until July 14, 1949. During WWII there was the rationalizing of gasoline and food. In 1948, the area was severely hit with polio. NOTE: By 1962 or '63, the numbering of the reunions no longer reflected the years the reunions were not held.

Editor's Comments

It's time to be getting the spring 2015 issue of the *Killian Family Newsletter* in the mail. It really doesn't seem very much like spring, but March 20 and spring flowers will be here soon. I hope the spring weather will be nice where you are. The weather has been very interesting so far this winter.

In 2002, I attended my first Killian Reunion with my wife Cheryl. I am remembering there were about twenty people in attendance that year. I'm still not sure how it happened, but in 2005 I became the editor of the *Killian Family Newsletter*. Our first edition as editor was published in November that year (all four pages). When I talk about the Killian Family Newsletter I always like to say "we or our", because Cheryl is as much the editor as I. In the years following 2002, I have seen The Killian Association (now AKDHA) grow quite a bit. In 2009, AKDHA become a 501 (c) (3) organization and contributions to AKDHA are now tax deductible. Also in 2009, the first Killian book in 70 years was published; *The Family of North Carolina Pioneer Andreas Killian*. In 2011, a second book was published; *The Forefathers of North Carolina Pioneer Andreas Killian* by William McCreight. The reunion has grown from a one day reunion to a three day reunion attracting descendants of Andreas Killian from all over the USA and Germany.

AKDHA has no paid employees and is staffed entirely by a group of very dedicated volunteers who have made the growth of AKDHA possible. We have lost some of our volunteers along the way and they can never be replaced. But, we have been very fortunate to have new volunteers to step in and carry on. They bring with them new ideas and energy, things that every organization needs to continue to grow and improve. If you are interested in becoming involved with our association, there is always a need. In 2034, the AKDHA will be having its 100th Reunion and we want it to be very special. I know that 20 years seems far away; but time passes a lot faster than we think. In the mean time, we need new people just to get us there.

AKDHA is dependent entirely on contributions. So for all who are able, we would greatly appreciate your donation. AKDHA is an incorporated public charity and all contributions are tax deductible. AKDHA has special projects that must be funded. Last year, two descendants of Andreas received \$500 scholarships to help fund their education. It has been said that our young people are our future and that is surly true for AKDHA. Another project is refurbishing headstones in Old Saint Paul's Cemetery which is much needed. The education and supplies to do the work come with a cost. If you haven't tried headstone restoration, it is hard work and rewarding work. In Memory of Pete Whitener

Peter "Pete" Wilfong Whitener Jr. passed away September 26, 2014, just two weeks after the 80th AKDHA Reunion. He had planned to attend the reunion Friday Night to hear the presentation by David Kilby, the president of the local Sons of the American Revolution (SAR). In 2010, he received approval for SAR membership. 2010 was the year Pete became AKDHA's beloved Treasurer. I say beloved, because he was so good at his job. He had retired in June 2009 as a Vice President at Bank of Granite after 34 years in the Banking Industry.

Pete was special in the genealogy world. He was born June 13, 1946 and was a descendant of Andreas Killian's son, John. Pete grew up on family land in Lincoln County that had been passed down from Jacob Killian, son John Killian. Can you imagine, living on land that had been in your family for decades? His mom, Mildred Cansler Whitener, served as Secretary/Treasurer of the Killian reunions in the 1950s. His grandmother, Daisy Catherine Yount Cansler, talked often of her Killian cousins and it was Pete's great-grandmother Daisy Cynthia Mary Killian Yount who was the last Killian in his lineage.

The Executive Committee of the AKDHA is pleased to announce we will be awarding one (1) or two (2) \$500 scholarships this year. AKDHA Scholarship Award is a program that provides funds for children of members of AKDHA who are planning to further their education at one of the following:

- Vocational and technical schools (college level)
- Junior colleges
- Colleges or Universities

How the Scholarship Works

The program is available to children whose parent, grandparent, or guardian is an active member of the AKDHA (attendance of Annual Reunion or subscriber of *Killian Family Newsletter*) and a descendant of Andreas Killian.
